EDITORIAL

What a splendidly colourful autumn we have had. The trees in Charwelton are a kaleidoscope of leaves, and the berriss in red, orange, yellow, black, along with the crab apples, are abundant. The birds are not yet taking great numbers of these, though the expected cold spell we are promised (if you believe the forecasters) may change that.

The crab apples have provided us with many pots of crab apple jelly, and while the annual flowers have gone, what a collection of seeds they have left. We have gathered such things as poppy seeds, foxgloves, teasels, and having sown them all a few weeks ago we now have trays of thriving young plants all ready to go out in the spring. Next year's garden colour for nothing!

It is often said that a plethora of fruits in the autumn heralds a hard winter; we shall see!

On the subject of hard winters, I am presently Nicholson which tells the story of the very cold winter of 1962, which I remember well as a medical student in Leeds. It has taken me back with a jolt to the horrendous smogs of that time - long before the Clean Air Acts - when for long stretches of the winter the only safe way of getting around in the towns was by tram; cars and buses were far too dangerous as the drivers simply could not see where they were going, and even walking one could easily get lost even in areas one knew well.

The book also discusses other aspects of life at that time, such as the rise of satirical/comedy broadcasting on television, notably the introduction of "That Was The Week That Was" (commonly known as TW3) which started in the autumn of 1962. Reading that chapter took me straight back to Saturday nights out. I was a member of the University Air Squadron and spent most of my Saturday evenings in the Officers' Mess in University Road. I remember well that every week as soon as TW3 came on the bar would empty and all of us, and our giftiends would decant into the ante-room (where the mess TV was kept) and where for the next hour we would be convulsed with laughter. They don't make them like that any more!

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

A Christmas to Sav(i)our

Well, by the time you read this you may well have had your first (or fifth) mince pie, your tree may be up, and you may be enjoying your favourite tipple. "Go Early and Go Big – you deserve a special Christmas this year" seems to be the message in most Christmas ads which have themselves arrived a tad earlier than usual.

Now, if you want to put your decorations up in November that's your choice, but I know that the earlier we tend to throw ourselves into Christmas the sooner we want to be done with it after December 25th and that's a shame. You see, I must confess that I like the Sainsbury's Christmas ad this vear, it's not the most charming, or the most ingenious ad, it doesn't pluck your heart strings or even make you laugh, but I do like their strapline - "A Christmas to Savour".

Too often Christmas is a frenetic dash of shopping, cooking, entertaining, indulging and even services. We bounce from one Christmas themed moment to the next until we arrive in a crumpled heap on Boxing Day, pick ourselves up, dust ourselves off and do it all again at New Year and then survey the grey wilderness that is January with contempt.

Perhaps we need to stretch Christmas out – not the shopping. cooking, entertaining etc, but the real Christmas. I always wonder how long the shepherds stayed when they went to see Jesus, new born amongst the animals to a young couple in Bethlehem. We are told "So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them." (Luke 2:16-18) but how long did they hang around? After all no mum who has recently given birth wants visitors to stay too long.

> Perhaps you know that feeling? Every year by Boxing Day you are desperately wondering when those beloved guests will be packing up and heading home to provide you with a little "you" time; and yet, Christmas invites us to overstay our welcome, to sayour this season, to pause. reflect, experience, marvel, wonder, enjoy and celebrate, to let the true impact of Christmas sink in and absorb the reality that God sent us a Christmas Saviour to rescue us from fear and darkness and hopelessness and doubt.

That really is something to savour

- a saviour to savour, in fact; good news to dwell on and receive. That's what we will be doing in our Christmas services and you are more than welcome to come and join us as we explore that wonderful truth, sing emotive carols and listen to the timeless readings.

So, by all means, go early and go big this Christmas, but also savour the Saviour and get the very best out of this season.

Christmas Decorations

Fly Posting

Village organisation, such as The Church, the Village Hall, the School, the WI, the Girl Guides, the Public House and the History Society are encouraged to advertise their events on the Parish notice boards. There are environmental laws which prohibit 'Fly Posting' on telegraph poles and street furniture etc. Any notices or posters advertising an event for commercial gain will be removed without notice.

Dog Fouling

There is still a problem around the village with dog owners not picking up after their animals. We have joined the Paint means Poo campaign. It was agreed the parish council will join this campaign to highlight the ongoing problems with inconsiderate dog owners allowing dog fouling. If you own or walk a dog, please take a bag with you to pick up after your animal.

Posts around The Village Green

Along the side of the village green, on Badby Road (opposite the telephone box), wooden posts will be erected to stop cars parking on the village green. This is occurring when children are being dropped off at school or are being collected from school.

Vehicle Activated Speed Signs

To help reduce speeding vehicles in and around the village, two new VAS signs are being purchased, making four in total. One will be permanently placed by the Mounts Lane cross roads, for cars entering the village. Three of the signs will be able to collect data, vehicle speeds, times of day and direction of travel, for collation and then forwarding to Northamptonshire Highways and the Police.
