EDITORIAL

have been trying to decide what to write here this month but every time I compose something the situation changes.

In the end I think I will stick to my original plan and simply say that I hope you all had a good Christmas, as I hope our family will have had too. It will have been so good to have the family together again (the first time all 10 of us have been together for nearly two years). Not that we are strangers to disturbed Christmases. I can count on my fingers the number of completely undisturbed Christmases I had in 40 years in practice. With a relatively small rota each partner was on call for one day nearly every Christmas period, and even when I wasn't, there would sometimes be a short visit with the children on Christmas morning to Danetre Hospital (in those days largely a long stay geriatric one) where we always got a warm welcome.

All that isn't a complaint; It was part of the job, and something which made being a family doctor such a rewarding life.

I do not believe that the current apocalyptic Covid predictions will come to fruition this time any more than they have in the past. I belong to the school of thought which holds that the signs from South Africa are encouraging and that the Omicron variant, though much more infectious, will prove to be less virulent and will burn itself out quite quickly and naturally.

So let's all be positive and look on the bright side - and of course make sure we are all vaccinated.

In a lighter vein, some interesting views on the current enthusiasm for cycling were expressed recently by the director of Euro Exim Bank, who believes that the bicycle is a disaster for the country's economy.

He said that "the cyclist does not buy cars and does not borrow money to buy. He does not pay for insurance policies. He does not buy

fuel, does not pay for the necessary maintenance and repairs. He does not use paid parking. He does not cause serious accidents. He does not require multi-lane highways. He does not get fat. Healthy people are neither needed nor useful for the economy. They don't buy medicine. They do not go to hospitals or doctors, and they add nothing to the country's GDP.

On the other hand, every new McDonald's restaurant creates at least 30 jobs: 10 cardiologists, 10 dentists, 10 dietary experts and nutritionists, and obviously, the people who work at the restaurant itself."

So choose carefully: cyclist or McDonald's? It is worth considering.

PS Walking is even worse. Pedestrians don't even buy bicycles.

Here is some useful advice for visitors to Britain when the holiday season gets under way again -

Britain is proud of its literary heritage; there is a bookmaker on the street corner of even the poorest neighbourhood from which visitors can order bespoke editions of Shakespeare or Dickens

While touring the British countryside in winter make sure to look out for pigs in blankets.

The people of Edinburgh love to be complimented on living in one of the finest English cities.

If you run out of money or credit, look for the sign "Free Cash Machine".

Finally, all those of us involved in the production of The Link, wish you all a very Happy, Peaceful, and Safe New Year.

Last New Year we didn't have any banners up in the Vicarage that read "Happy New Year!" or "Welcome 2021", we didn't even wish each other a "Happy New Year" instead, on the stroke of midnight we said the words we had printed out on a sheet stuck up on the wall – "Good riddance 2020!"

That's what it felt like a year ago – 2020 had been a dreadful year, one unlike any that most of us had ever known, it was a relief to see the back of it and head into the New Year with the tentative hopes in the then new vaccine.

Well, here we are twelve months down the line. Is it "Good riddance 2021" or "Happy New Year 2022?" I suspect that whichever you go for, there will be a mix of emotions, events and situations in the coming year, some different and some similar to those in 2021. In an uncertain world, a little consistently good news would be nice

The Bible reminds us in Hebrews 13:8 that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever" – Jesus who we remembered coming at the time we call Christmas as "God with us", born to reveal God to us and to die on the Cross in our place and defeat death on our behalf by rising again is not just for the festive period, not just a seasonal fairy-tale, not just a nice story for the dark nights. All because the love, faithfulness, hope, mercy and holiness of Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever.

Good riddance 2021 or Happy New Year 2022, how good it is, at the start of a new year, to know the love of Christ in which we stand.





You may be aware that the Church needs a new roof. The latest inspection identified rotting timbers which can only be accessed by removing the existing roof slates. Unfortunately these have become too brittle to refit afterwards. Grants for the work have been gained, several of which involve matchfunding i.e. we need to raise money ourselves in order to release the grants. With over £20,000 a vear to find just to cover our running costs, raising additional funds to repair the roof looked like a very difficult challenge. However, we have been blessed with a wonderfully kind legacy which means we can finally give the go-ahead to the work, which we hope will start this month. At the time of writing, a detailed schedule is not yet available, but we hope to keep the Church open for services and visitors as much as possible and minimise periods when access needs to be closed. We will of course keep everyone updated.

Fly Posting


