I am not sure how much truth is in that saying but I have always been fascinated about the connections between this and the way we talk about God.

'Lion' and 'Lamb' are both images we use for Jesus. The Bible speaks of 'the Lion of Judah' which we see reflected in hymns and modern worship songs. CS Lewis gives us the story of Narnia where Aslan, the Lion, is killed on the stone table and then seen again. Death and Resurrection.

The 'Lamb of God' is used by John the Baptist about Jesus directly, the idea of sacrifice, the lamb given on behalf of others. Broadbent is a wonder, so real and sincere it doesn't feel like acting... and Wilton equals him." [103 mins, 12 certificate]


HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

The Parish Council recently approved the planting of bulbs within several locations throughout Badby. Planting will take place in Autumn 2025, ready for flowering in Spring 2026. The bulbs will be planted by volunteers in the vicinity of street furniture to add value as well as beauty to some of the shared public spaces in Badby.

- 1. The (Main) Green near to benches, phone box and areas near to the road.
- 2. Village Hall in vicinity of swamp area.
- 3. Bus Stop Green near to Bus stop and also adjacent to the A361.
- 4. Windmill Green near to noticeboard.
- 5. Church Green near to salt Bin and near to Bench nr Churchyard wall.
- 6. Entrances to village near to welcome signs to village.
- 7. New tree area near football pitch in vicinity of gate.

BENEFICE DEVELOPMENTS

Following the recent resignation of the Vicar of Weedon, Everdon and Dodford there has been a suggestion from the diocese that consideration might be given to Everdon joining the Knightley Benefice. Pots & Plans: what to do in your garden this March

1. Prepare seedbeds

With the longer days and warmer soil, March is perfect to prepare seedbeds for sowing hardy flowers and vegetables. As well as to clear patches for new permanent planting with shrubs, fruit bushes, and perennials.

Start by clearing any debris and weeds. Then if your soil is workable, and not too wet or frozen, lightly tickle the surface to de-compact. This will create a welcoming space for seeds and young transplants. Or dive in with a small fork or spade if you need to add more compost or remove stubborn weeds. If your soil is very compact or needs drainage or other works, it's best to start improvements as early as possible.

Generally, minimal soil disturbance is best. For instance

- A little bit of soil debris makes a wonderful habitat for beneficial wildlife. This community of creatures will munch on pest species later in spring and summer. So your space needn't be pristine.
- Only digging where needed will unearth fewer dormant weed seeds. So reducing the number of weeds. Less digging also preserves the soil structure that's been created so carefully by roots, fungi, and other useful organisms.

2. Sow early crops

You can now sow seeds of hardy crops like broad beans, peas, spinach, and early varieties of carrots and radishes. Plus calendula, sweet peas, and other flowers.

For tender plants like tomatoes, peppers, and

marigolds, start them indoors in seed trays or pots on a sunny windowsill or in a greenhouse. This gives them a head start before planting out in late May when the risk of frost has usually passed.

3. Sow even earlier crops

Can't wait for a snack? Sow fast-growing salad greens now 'under cover'. This creates a microclimate of heat and moisture.

You can grow under cover using plastic or glass 'cloches'. These cover one or two plants. Or use mini-polytunnels that cover a whole row. Greenhouse and cold frames are useful too.

Crop that responds well under cover include lettuce, spinach, and rocket. For the best results, choose varieties bred for earlier sowing. There are lots of varieties to choose from in our local garden centres and online. Sow early. Harvest quick. Go again!

4. Join the hunt

March is when slugs and weeds wake up. You'll find both working fast to nibble and out compete shoots of your favourite plants.

Reduce slug damage using traps or handpick them in the early morning or evening. Look for their hiding places.... (my slugs hide in my stack of old plant containers). Organic slug pellets are also helpful and harmless to other wildlife.

Reduce weeds with the humble hoe and hand fork. I like using both tools. When clean and sharp, the hoe slides beautifully over the soil surface to nip out weed seedlings, while I deploy my fork when I uncover deeper roots. It's a few minutes to remove weeds when smaller, but quite an undertaking if they get tangled with new growth you want to keep.

Council Update

Addressing flooding concerns continued to dominate the February meeting, with items relating to tree maintenance, and the forthcoming mowing and strimming season also being discussed. Residents' concerns regarding the condition of stiles on footpaths and the accesssignage on Wet Lane were also raised.

Following the **flooding on 24th November**, communication with West Northamptonshire Council Highways Department regarding the short term and longer-term actions to avoid a repeat of this incident have been ongoing. In addition, we agreed to establish the status of the remaining drainage work on Daventry Road/Newnham Hill. The Flood Team Working Group is liaising with the Environment Agency regarding the River Nene and the work required to 'clear' the river and its banks. It was agreed that a list of tasks which might reduce risks of flooding, such as the clearance of leaves from drains in the Autumn, should be compiled and actions assigned. The Parish Council is also exploring options to have a supply of sandbags available in the event of future flooding risks.

As the new growing season is approaching, we discussed the **mowing and strimming regime** around the village. Feedback last year was largely positive but we encourage any feedback on how it can be improved. The Council is responsible for maintaining the greens, verges, the churchyard and the burial ground. Mowing will initially be weekly when the grass grows most vigorously, then fortnightly from July onwards.


The Parish Council is also responsible for maintaining the trees in the village. An annual survey has recommended the work required, and we are currently sourcing quotes from local tree surgeons. We have agreed to increase the level of work in the churchyard in order to keep it safe and tidy. This will include removing the growth at the base of the lime trees.

As always, the showing of **snowdrops** around the village has been spectacular. This year, thousands of snowdrops have been planted around the village entrance signs. They have been planted by Sue and Geoff Chester in memory of Sue's Mum, Mavis, and will make a significant addition to the floral display as they thicken over time. Thanks go to Geoff and Sue.

Preparations for the **celebration of the 80th Anniversary of VE Day** continue to take shape. There will be a Beacon bonfire on Thursday 8^{th} May with a party on the Green on 10^{th} May. The marquee has been booked and the music arranged. More details of the celebrations will evolve.
