



EDITORIAL

The wild life continues to flourish. We are seeing the hedgehogs feeding every evening, often 2 or 3 and looking very healthy.

The blue tits laid 10 eggs, and by 3 May 5 chicks had hatched, followed shortly after by another 4. So we currently have 9 healthy looking chicks, which are, as I write, getting very near to fledging. It is fascinating to watch them progress from helpless, blind pink blobs at birth to pretty well fully feathered miniature (indeed not all that miniature!) adults now. Watching them is the highlight of every child's visit here.

We also have a profusion of other birds coming to feed - chaffinches, gold finches, green finches, wrens, as well as sparrows, dunnocks, and some starlings All being watched over (or so it appears) by kites and buzzards which nest in the spinney.

Since our last issue our Roman Catholic brethren have lost their Pope; a great loss to them. I know nothing about the relative merits of the candidates to replace him, but by all accounts Pope Leo has been welcomed on all sides as a very worthy successor and was appointed in less than 3 weeks after Pope Francis's death.

We, the CofE, on the other hand learned last September that our Archbishop of Canterbury was to step down, and at present it looks as though it will be next September before his successor is appointed. Could it be that we might have something to learn from the Roman church?



PASTORAL LETTER

"I know I always can trust you"

Towards the end of my recent sabbatical leave, I went to Lee Abbey on the North Devon coast for a Prayer Retreat to reflect upon retirement later this year.

One of the wise guides suggested it would be good to choose a "theme song" for this next stage in life. At first I didn't think this was a very good idea! Then I remembered that on a previous visit, fifteen years ago, before my interview to be one of your Bishops, I sang a hymn on my prayer walks.

That hymn was *"Father, I place into your hands the things I cannot do"* by Jenny Hewer and it has been a special favourite ever since. It's a wonderful reminder of God's trustworthiness in the face of life's challenges. The verses cover the whole range of anxious questions; "What will I do?" "Where will I go?" "Who will I be?" "What about my family?" and "How will I cope?"

The final verse focusses on walking close to God and loving his people, the Church; *"Father, I want to be with you and do the things you do, Father, I want to speak the words that you are speaking too, Father, I want to love the ones that you will draw to you."*

It's a lovely call to pastoral leadership and it continues to inspire me after 39 years of ordained ministry.



But my wavering loyalty to God is overwhelmed by his faithfulness to me. In response to an enquiry about faith during a Question & Answer session with school children at the Cathedral, I said; "Faith is less about what you believe, more about who you can trust".

This month I celebrated the Golden anniversary of my Confirmation. After over 50 years of following Jesus, "I know I can always trust him."



Pots & Plans: what to do in your garden this June

Harvest strawberries

Strawberries ripen rapidly in June on lively plants. Pick them early in the day when they're firm, and check daily to prevent over ripening. If you see spoiled fruits, remove quickly to discourage pests and diseases. And if you have strawberries left over from breakfast, excess fruit can be frozen or made into iam.

Snip, snip

Many summer-flowering plants benefit from deadheading. Snipping off faded flowers will encourage fresh blooms rather than seed production. It's also great fun to get up close and personal with your plants to enjoy their fragrance, colours, and wildlife. You can also reward yourself with wine after deadheading. But remember to deadhead every week

Control growth

Tomato plants transform in June from polite young plants into rampant fruit machines. Left unchecked. shoots grow everywhere. This makes it harder to support plants using canes and harder to retain good air flow for healthier growth.

The solution is to remove 'side shoots'. Sides shoots arow from between the stem and leaf from hidden buds. Removal is easiest when side shoots are an

inch long using finger and thumb, or secateurs if preferred (or if shoots are larger). Check each week.

However, leave side shoots alone if you're growing bush or trailing tomato plants. These varieties are naturally bushy and compact.

Keep weeding

Weeds are just as lively as other plants in June. Regular hoeing between plants or using a mulch will help keep them in check. If tackling deep-rooted weeds, a hand fork is best for precise removal. Remove weeds regularly before they take hold and compete for nutrients.

Water wisely

As temperatures rise (even more than spring), efficient watering becomes essential. Early mornings or late evenings reduce evaporation. It's best to focus on roots rather than leaves - and water more, but less often, to encourage deeper roots and more independent plants. For thirsty crops like tomatoes, a mulch helps retain moisture by sheltering the soil surface. Compost is good for mulching at two inches deep. As are comfrev leaves at four inches deep.

Snip again

Regularly harvest herbs to keep them bushy and compact. This also improves flavour. Although I like to leave some herbs untrimmed for enjoy their flowers. Pollinators love them too.

Council Update

The new Council met on the 12th May. This was the first meeting since the Local Government Elections and we were joined by our two West Northants Councillors; Rupert Frost and Charlie Hastie. This was also the Parish Council's Annual Meeting, where Councillors are elected to certain roles. All post holders were re-elected which puts the Council in a strong position going forwards. We have a full complement of Councillors who bring energy, experience and commitment to Newnham, and in Kevin Carr we have a Clerk who brings considerable experience.

The meeting received reports on the VE Day Anniversary Celebrations. An estimated 150 people made their way to the top of Walkers Hill (many by shuttle bus!) to enjoy the spectacular sight of the beacon against the backdrop of the Newnham countryside. Huge thanks to all those involved in building the bonfire, to Robin Leven for the 1940's musical entertainment and to Jude Dorkins for organising it. Two days later we had beautiful weather for the party on the Green. Around 250 people attended the event, with excellent music provided by local bands, a parade from the Church and stalls on the Green run by the Church, the Guides, the Village Hall, the WI and the History Society. The Green looked stunning, thanks to the work of the many volunteers who helped put up bunting, lights and marguees. A good time was had by all, but events like this have a value beyond the moment, by bringing a village together and strengthening a sense of community. Again, thanks to Jude for all the hours she spent organising the events, and helping Newnham to maintain its tradition of marking such occasions. The meeting also received a report on the Bus Shelter renovation. The work to re-roof and clad the interior and external walls has transformed the building into an attractive feature of the Green and creates a new community asset. Huge thanks to the volunteers from the History Society who gave up their time for this. The shelter now houses two information boards provided by the History Society with more to follow.

The Council received on update on flood prevention work. Lobbying of West Northants Council and the Environment Agency is ongoing but, in the meantime, the Parish Council has funded the provision of sand and sandbags to enable residents to improve their resilience in the event of future flooding. Thanks to Gary Niblett for this.

Councillor Debbie Bastin presented an update on a maintenance programme for the street lighting in the village and responsibility was assigned for commissioning various repair jobs around the village, one of which is the speed indicator on the Weedon Road. This has been sent away for repair and will be returned as soon as possible.
